WHEATLAND COUNTY, AB (June 21, 2020) – Wheatland County recognizes and celebrates National Indigenous History Month and National Indigenous Peoples Day. June is National Indigenous History Month - a time for all Canadians - Indigenous, non-Indigenous and newcomers - to reflect upon and learn the history, sacrifices, cultures, contributions, and strength of First Nations, Inuit, and Metis people. It is important to keep in mind that First Nations, Inuit, and Métis Peoples each have their own unique histories.

In cooperation with Indigenous organizations, the Government of Canada chose June 21, the summer solstice, for National Aboriginal Day, now known as National Indigenous Peoples Day. For generations, many Indigenous peoples and communities have celebrated their culture and heritage on or near this day due to the significance of the summer solstice as the longest day of the year.

Wheatland County is located within the Blackfoot Confederacy and Treaty 7 land. Our neighbours and friends of Siksika Nation Administration nurture the growth, independence, and well-being of the Blackfoot culture.
