# GOOD FOOD BOX

# Fresh Produce at a fraction of the Cost!

The Good Food Box program was established to encourage healthy eating while making it affordable for individuals and families alike. The program has been in our area since the fall of 2014 and offers fresh fruits and vegetables to its clients.

The program is available to anyone who is interested in taking part; no restrictions to numbers of boxes purchased or eligibility of participants.



# **Boxes can be purchased in three different sizes:**

SMALL which offers 25-30 pounds of food= \$27 MEDIUM which offers 35-40 pounds of food= \$32 LARGE which offers 45-50 pounds of food= \$37

\*There is a \$2 handling/shipping fee which is also added to the initial cost.

Each box contains the basic produce staples: potatoes, carrots, onions, apples and oranges with additional seasonal fruits and vegetables rounding out the weight.

The program is made possible because the Community Kitchens Program of Calgary (with whom we partner) bypasses the retailers and goes directly to importers and produce handlers in the province.

Wheatland FCSS in partnership with Calgary Foundation is **now offering** subsidy for Good Food Boxes to low-income residents of Wheatland County. A one time application completion and proof of income is required. If eligible you will be qualified for one Good Food Box per month until Dec 2023.

# MEALS ON WHEELS

Wheatland FCSS has partnered with Calgary Meals on Wheels Frozen Program to provide Wheatland County residents with nutritious and affordable meals. The program is available to anyone in Wheatland County regardless of age, finances or status.

All items are prepared by a Blue Ribbon chef in the most up-to-date facility for safe food production. Recipes are reviewed by a registered dietitian prior to production to ensure meals are balanced and meet dietary standards.

Frozen meal orders are placed bi-weekly. The following week orders are retrieved, sorted and stored at our office until delivery or pick up arrangements have been made.

The menu is extensive and offers a variety of entrees, soups and baked goods for individuals and families. Renal and gluten-free options are also available and we would be glad to give further information should you be interested. E-transfer payments are accepted.

Cost varies by product. Payment is by cheque or cash and is due on pick-up/delivery day.

Free Tax Preparation for upcoming 2022 Tax Year (and prior years as well).

- Volunteers are not employees of the Canada Revenue Agency.
- Remember to bring all your tax slips and forms with you.

#### Eligible individuals

- individuals not able to prepare their income tax return on their own
- it is a simple tax situation
- meets our income threshold guidelines
- business income within box 048 on a T4A slip less than \$1,000 with no related expenses
- interest income less than \$1,000

- are self-employed or have business expenses
- have rental income & expenses
- have capital gains or losses
- file for bankruptcy
- are deceased

# 2023 Property Assessment Re-Inspection Cycle

Property re-inspection is a provincial policy requiring municipalities to perform ongoing re-inspections and complete overall inspections of all properties over a five-year cycle. Wheatland County assesses residential and non-residential properties to determine their estimated market value annually, which is the basis for your property taxes.

Wheatland County Assessment Services will be performing property assessment reinspections of improved parcels located in Range 23 and 24, including Eagle Lake, Namaka and Nightingale. The purpose of these reinspections is to update property assessment information.

For the fourth year, the County is utilizing Residential Request for Information forms to streamline the re-inspection process for property owners and County Assessors. In April, a letter was sent to all residential property owners who are due for a re-inspection, requesting self-reporting of changes to their property. If we received a response, the Assessor will only take digital photos of the buildings during the site inspection.

If no response was received, then a reinspection will require taking photographs, asking questions to confirm building information and may require the buildings to be measured. All Assessors carry personal identification and wear a high visibility vest. The vehicle entering the yard site will be clearly marked with the Wheatland County logo and "Assessment Department" signage. Assessors will also adhere to all safety procedures.

The inspections will occur during the months of June, July, August and possibly September. If required, a call back card may be placed on the main entrance door of the residence or another conspicuous location, to request and gather assessment information.

The Assessment Department strives to prepare and maintain a fair and equitable property assessment base and would like to thank residents in advance for their cooperation during the 2023 assessment re-inspections.

# 2023 Tax Notice

Notices were sent April 21, 2023

Property taxes are due June 30, 2023. If you are paying through your bank, please select 'Wheatland County—Taxes' and use your roll number as the account number. If you own more than one property, you will need to pay for each property separately, using the roll number for each individual property.

Detailed information about payment options is online at

www.wheatlandcounty.ca/taxes/.

Please note, a penalty of 5% will be applied to unpaid balances after June 30, 2023, and again on November 30, 2023.

If you are on a Tax Installment Payment Plan (TIPP), no action is required, and your payments will be automatically adjusted for the new tax year.

If Canada Post changed your mailing address, please contact us to ensure your tax account is up to date.

Wheatland County sources property ownership and mailing address information from Alberta Land Titles Office and the Certificate of Title. It is the property owners' responsibility to ensure their Land Title record is accurate and up to date.

If you do not receive your tax notice by mid-May, please contact the Wheatland County Administration Office.

- Taxes are due June 30th and late penalties are applied July 1st.
- Non-receipt of your property tax bill does not exempt you from late payment
   penalties.
- Under the Municipal Government Act, Section 337, a tax notice is deemed to have been received seven days after it is sent.

# **Spring is here!**

Be sure to check for signs of water leaks, both indoors and outdoors, while you launch into Spring cleaning mode.

# Why?

Water expands when it freezes. This means that areas holding water might be forced to expand beyond size limits; therefore, causing cracks and leaks.

# **Spring Leak Prevention Checklist:**

- □ Complete a leaky toilet test using food colouring
- ☐ Check water drains for clogs
- □ Replace the filter in your refrigerator should you have a water/ice dispenser and inspect lines (twice yearly)
- □ Ensure your dishwasher is draining fully after
   a completed cycle
- □ Inspect water hoses on home appliances for

- external damage or wear
- □ Inspect garden hoses for external damage or wear
- □ Inspect all faucets and spigots on the inside and outside your home for drips
- ☐ Inspect outdoor water sprinkler systems for damage or wear



Enabling landowners to protect groundwater quality in Wheatland County

# UP TO \$6000 IN FUNDING

This program covers a portion of the cost of contracted Services (i.e. Certified Well Driller) and required materials for the following projects.

Funding is available for:

- Pitless Adaptor Well Pit Conversion 75% up to \$3500 per well
- Decommissioning of Unused Wells 75% up to \$2500 per well

#### **Program Guidelines**

- Landowners may receive a maximum of \$6000 over a threeyear period on a combination of projects. Project category maximums also apply on a three-year basis
- GST is not eligible for funding.
- Applications will be approved by the Agriculture and Environment Department on a first-come, first-served basis.
   Funding is limited to an annual budget which is subject to change without notice.
- This program is not retroactive. Applications must be approved prior to purchase of materials or services.
- The landowner is responsible for obtaining all required permits and approvals prior to initiating a project.
- The landowner is responsible for labour and equipment costs associated with projects over and above the funding maximums, as well as for ongoing project maintenance.
- Work on groundwater wells must be completed by a certified well driller
- Wheatland County staff may include information about funded projects in advertisements or publications associated with Wheatland County.
- Approved projects that are completed by October 15th will be prioritized, funding will not be guaranteed after this date.
- Applicants will be reimbursed following the completion of the project and submission of invoices.



# Shelterbelt & Ecobuffer Seedling Program

Up to \$2000 in funding!

This program supports landowners planting trees and shrubs throughout the County. There are many benefits of planting trees and shrubs which include:

- Improved building energy efficiency
- Adds aesthetic value to yard and landscape
- Provides wildlife and pollinator habitat
- Decreases soil erosion and crop damage
- Reduces standing water
- Snow capture for drift management and improved moisture retention.

#### What is a shelterbelt?

Means a row or rows of plantings made up of trees and/or shrubs that are positioned in such a manner as to provide shelter from the wind, snow, and to protect soil from erosion.

#### What is an Ecobuffer

Eco-Buffers are plantings of perennial species (i.e. trees, shrubs, and/or herbaceous plants) designed to mimic a natural forest habitat that provides specific ecosystem services.

#### Planting & Maintenance

Mulching and watering (for a minimum of 3 years), planting as early as possible in the spring or late fall, and excluding livestock from the area are essential factors for successful establishment of trees and shrubs.



## **Program Guidelines**

- THIS PROGRAM IS NOT RETROACTIVE Applications must be approved prior to purchase of all project components. Program opens November 1st.
- Applicants may receive up to \$2000 per year for the following
  - \$2.50 per Seedling (1-2yr old) to a maximum of \$1000
  - \$500 for Drip Irrigation supplies
  - \$500 Mulch (fibre, wood, plastic etc.)
- GST and shipping costs are not eligible
- Planting must occur on land within Wheatland County.
- Wheatland County ratepayers are eligible for funding for personal, residential or farm use. Commercial or industrial businesses are not eligible. Plants or materials purchased through the program may not be used for commercial resale.
- Applications will be approved by the Agriculture and Environment Department on a first-come, first-served basis.
- The Applicant is responsible for all costs associated with projects over and above the funding maximum, as well as for ongoing project maintenance.
- Planting projects must be compliant with the Wheatland County Land Use Bylaw setbacks. " no shrub, tree, shelterbelt or any other obstruction shall be erected or placed within:
  - i. 15.24 m (50.0 ft) from the nearest limit of a public road rights-of-way.
  - ii. 22.86 m (75.0 ft) from an intersection of two or more road rights-of-way."
- The applicant will be reimbursed when the project is complete.
- Receipts are due by **June 30th**
- Applicants must submit photos of the finished project by July 31st
- Non-eligible species include; Autumn and Russian Olive, Common Barberry, Common Buckthorn, and Saltcedar.
- Not recommended: Caragana

- Filter excess nutrients including phosphorous and nitrogen, preventing them from entering our rivers, lakes and groundwater systems.
- Minimize overland flooding by storing, slowing and absorbing excess water, helping to protect roads, culverts and agricultural fields.
- Store thousands of tons of carbon, preventing it from entering the atmosphere.
- Provide homes for pollinators like bees, butterflies, moths and beetles.
- Sustain species that prey on agricultural pests.
- Provide thousands of acres of habitat for grassland-dependent mammals and birds, including pheasants and grey partridge.

# Fire Permits

A fire which is contained in an incinerator, barbeque or residential fire pit does not require a Fire Permit under **Bylaw 2019-06**. In Wheatland County a fire permit is required for any other type of controlled fire. There is no charge for a fire or fireworks permit. If conditions are breached or the weather deteriorates, permits may be cancelled at any time. Upon suspension or cancellation of any notification; which will include immediately extinguishing any fire set according to their permit.

Our Fire Bans are applicable to only our County. Other jurisdictions and Provincial Parks will have their own regulations. Refer to albertafirebans.ca

# **Sky Lanterns & Fire Crackers**

Wheatland County Fire Services would like to remind residents that:

- Fire Crackers and Flying Lanterns (also known as a sky lantern) are prohibited in Alberta. If you see them being used, call 911 and report it to the Fire Department immediately.
- Fireworks are regulated under Section 5.7 of the National Fire Code – Alberta Edition and a permit is required to launch fireworks.

# **Smoke Alarms**

Smoke alarms are a key part of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

## **Safety Tips**

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Current alarms on the market employ different types of technology including multisensing, which could include smoke and carbon monoxide combined.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.



## **Action Items to Improve Your Home's Survivability:**

- **REMOVE** leaves, pine needles, and other flammable material from the roof, gutters, and on and under the deck to help prevent embers from igniting your home.
- **SCREEN** areas below decks and porches with 1/8" wire mesh to help prevent material from accumulating underneath.
- **COVER** exterior attic and soffit vents with 1/8" wire mesh to help prevent sparks from entering your home.
- **ENCLOSE** eaves to help prevent ember entry.
- INSPECT shingles or roof tiles. REPLACE missing shingles or tiles. COVER ends of tiles with bird stops or cement to help prevent ember penetration during a wildfire.

# **Tips for Landscaping Around Your Home**

- REMOVE dead vegetation and other flammable materials, especially within the first 5 feet of the home.
- **KEEP** your lawn hydrated and maintained. If it is brown, cut it down to help reduce fire intensity.
- **PRUNE** tree limbs so the lowest branches are 6 to 10 feet above the ground to help reduce the chance of fire getting into the crowns of the trees.
- MOVE construction material, trash, and woodpiles at least 30 feet away from the home and other outbuildings.
- DISPOSE of branches, weeds, leaves, pine needles, and grass clippings that you have cut to reduce fuel for fire.

# **Driveway Etiquette**

Ensure emergency access to your property

Driveways require a minimum of four metres (12 feet) vertical clearance and a minimum of four metres (12 feet) width to provide safety access for firefighting and other emergency vehicles.

Any driveway longer than 90 metres (300 feet) should have a turn-out space to allow fire trucks or other firefighting equipment to pass or to turn around.


Do not block your access route with gates, archways or other things that will impede the entrance of emergency vehicles.

Park your vehicles off to the side and keep clutter from blocking the driveway.

If you have a dugout or other water source like a lake or river, ensure that there is access to allow trucks to fill with water.



- Draw a map of your home. Show all doors and windows.
- Visit each room. Find two ways out.
- All windows and doors should open easily. You should be able to use them to get outside.
- Make sure your home has smoke alarms. Push the test button to make sure each alarm is working.
- Pick a meeting place outside. It should be in front of your home. Everyone will meet at the meeting place.
- ☐ Make sure your house or building number can be seen from the street.
- Talk about your plan with everyone in your home.
- Learn the emergency phone number for your fire department.
- Practice your home fire drill!

# Wheatland County WY EEDUCATION DOWNY Brome

Bromus tectorum

### **Alberta Weed Act Designation Noxious**

Noxious Weeds have the ability to spread rapidly, cause severe crop losses and economic hardship. These weeds must be controlled to prevent further establishment and spread. It is a landowners duty to control this plant if it occurs on their property

Native to the Mediterranean, downy brome (cheatgrass, downy chess) is a winter annual in the Poaceae (Grass) family. Prefers cool, semi-arid environments with coarse sandy or loamy soils on sunny, south/west facing slopes. Reproduces by seed (up to 5,000 seeds per plant). Hand-pulling, grazing or herbicide.

### **Similar Species**

Non-Native: Japanese brome (Bromus japonicus), field brome (Bromus squarrosus)

Native: May resemble native brome grasses before seed-set, which are perennial rather than annual.

Leaf	Leaf blades are long, 2-4 mm wide and covered with soft hairs; ligule is 1-3 mm long and toothed.
1. Mature Plant/ Infestation	Stems are covered in soft hairs and up to 5-60 cm tall dependent on moisture availability.
2. Flower	Flowering spike droops to one side, reddish-purple at maturity, 7-20 cm long; awns are reddish, twisted, long and covered with soft hairs.
Root	Fibrous roots up to 1.5 m deep.
